like melodramas, comedies, romances and others cultivating a massive pan-African following exceeding 1 billion viewers across the continent (BusinessDay, 2023).

The stories told by the industry, often revolving around central themes of family, spirituality, communal traditions and more, provide insightful and authentic windows into the core of modern African societies (Onuzulike, 2009).
